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SPECIAL INDULGENCE FOR THE YEAR FOR PRIESTS

During the Year for Priests, beginning on 19 June 2009 and ending on 19 June 2010, the gift of special Indulgences is granted as described in the Decree of the Apostolic Penitentiary, published on 12 May.

A. Truly repentant priests who, on any day, devoutly recite at least morning Lauds or Vespers before the Blessed Sacrament, exposed for public adoration or replaced in the tabernacle, and who, after the example of Saint John Mary Vianney, offer themselves with a ready and generous heart for the celebration of the sacraments, especially Confession, are mercifully granted in God the *Plenary Indulgence* which they may also apply to their deceased brethren in suffrage, if, in conformity with the current norms, they receive sacramental confession and the Eucharistic banquet and pray for the Supreme Pontiff's intentions.

Furthermore the *Partial Indulgence* is granted to priests who may apply it to their deceased confreres every time that they devoutly recite the prayers duly approved to lead a holy life and to carry out in a holy manner the offices entrusted to them.

B. The *Plenary Indulgence* is granted to all the faithful who are truly repentant who, in church or in chapel, devoutly attend the divine Sacrifice of Mass and offer prayers to Jesus Christ the Eternal High Priest, for the priests of the Church, and any other good work which they have done on that day, so that he may sanctify them and form them in accordance with His Heart, as long as they have made expiation for their sins through sacramental confession and prayed in accordance with the Supreme Pontiff's intentions: on the days in which the Year for Priests begins and ends, on the day of the 150th anniversary of the pious passing of Saint John Mary Vianney, on the first Thursday of the month or on any other day established by the local Ordinaries for the benefit of the faithful.

The *Plenary Indulgence* will likewise be granted to the elderly, the sick and all those who for any legitimate reason are confined to their homes who, with a mind detached from any sin and with the intention of fulfilling as soon as possible the three usual conditions, at home or wherever their impediment detains them, provided that on the above-mentioned days they recite prayers for the sanctification of priests and confidently offer the illnesses and hardships of their lives to God through Mary Queen of Apostles.

2008-2009 JUBILEE YEAR
50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEDICATION OF THE
BASILICA OF THE NATIONAL SHRINE OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

For the period of the Jubilee, November 20, 2008-November 20, 2009, the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI has granted a *Plenary Indulgence* (remission of temporal punishment due to sin) on the truly penitent members of the faithful who, on the usual conditions (sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayers for the Holy Father's intentions) duly fulfilled: a. If they undertake a sacred pilgrimage to the Upper Church of the Basilica of the National Shrine and they devoutly participate in the liturgical celebration or other pious exercise; b. if they visit the jubilee Temple either alone or with a group and there at least devote themselves to pious considerations for an appropriate period of time to be concluded with the Our Father, Creed, and invocations to the Immaculate Virgin Mary.

The elderly, the infirm and everyone who for legitimate reason cannot leave their homes, joining themselves in heartfelt desire to others who will undertake a pious visitation or pilgrimage can likewise obtain a *Plenary Indulgence*, provided that, with a resolute detestation for every sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible the three customary conditions, they recite devoutly the prayers before some sacred image as mentioned above and they humbly offer the illnesses or inconveniences of their own lives to the merciful God through Mary.

In Oboedientia Veritatis

Significance

The phrase *In Oboedientia Veritatis* — “in obedience to the truth” — is taken from 1 Peter 1:22: “Having purified our souls in obedience to the truth, let us love one another intensely from the heart.” During a Mass with the members of the International Theological Commission in the Redemptoris Mater Chapel on 6 October 2006, Pope Benedict XVI made reference to this passage in his homily: “A beautiful phrase from the First Letter of Saint Peter springs to my mind. It is from verse 22 of the first chapter. The Latin goes like this: *Castificantes animas nostras in oboedientia veritatis*. Obedience to the truth must ‘purify’ our souls and thus guide us to upright speech and upright action. In other words, speaking in the hope of being applauded, governed by what people want to hear out of obedience to the dictatorship of current opinion, is considered to be a sort of prostitution: of words and of the soul. The “purity” to which the Apostle Peter is referring means not submitting to these standards, not seeking applause, but rather, seeking obedience to the truth. . . . This is the fundamental virtue for the theologian, this disciple of obedience to the truth; it makes us, although it may be hard, collaborators of the truth, mouthpieces of truth. For it is not we who speak in today’s river of words, but it is the truth which speaks in us, who are really purified and made chaste by obedience to the truth. So it is that we can truly be harbingers of the truth.”

Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments

The Congregations of the Roman Curia assist the Holy Father in his exercise of his apostolic ministry as Vicar of Christ and Successor of Saint Peter. The particular area of responsibility of the Congregation for Divine Worship is the regulation of the liturgy and the administration of the sacraments. The congregation is also charged with the promotion of the liturgy, especially the Eucharist, and with oversight of liturgical texts. Leading the congregation in these and other responsibilities is the Prefect, Cardinal Antonio Cañizares Llovera, Archbishop Emeritus of Toledo in Spain, who is assisted by the Under-Secretary, Fr. Anthony Ward, S.M. Archbishop Di Noia will join them as Secretary of the Congregation.

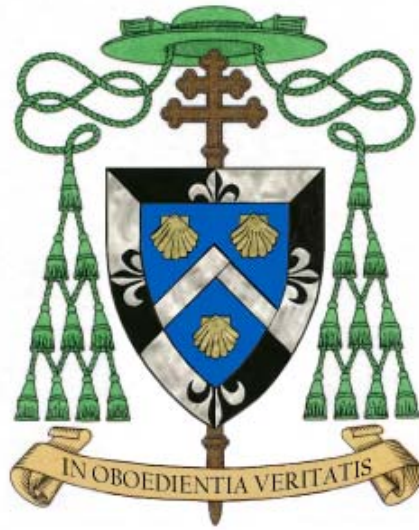
Titular See of Oregon City (Oregonopolitanus)

A Titular See is a Diocese or Archdiocese that, for some reason, now exists in title only, with a Titular Bishop or Archbishop who is not a diocesan ordinary. The Archdiocese of Oregon City was established by Pope Pius IX on 24 July 1846, with Francis Norbert Blanchet as the first Archbishop. It is the second oldest Archdiocese in the United States after Baltimore. The Archdiocese of Oregon City was transferred to Portland in 1928. On the 150th anniversary of the erection of the Archdiocese of Oregon City in 1996, it was designated a Titular Metropolitan See. Archbishop Di Noia is the first Titular Archbishop to be named to the See.

Blazon or Heraldic Description

Gyronny of eight Sable and Argent with a cross fleury counterchanged. An inescutcheon Azure, on a chevron between three escallops or, a carpenter's square Argent.

Interpretation

The shield adopts the classical arms of the Dominican Order (*gyronny of eight Sable and Argent with a cross fleury counterchanged*). It is surmounted by a smaller shield (*inescutcheon*), reminiscent of the coat of arms of the Dominican Province of Saint Joseph with a blue field honoring the Blessed Virgin Mary, and with two charges: (1) The *carpenter's square in silver* honoring Saint Joseph after whom Archbishop Di Noia was named at his baptism at Immaculate Conception Church, Bronx, New York on 18 July 1943. (2) The *golden scallop shell*, repeated three times in honor of the Blessed Trinity and recalling the infused theological virtues of faith, hope and charity. The shell itself has a triple symbolism. First, it refers to Saint Augustine of Hippo, Bishop and Doctor of the Church whose name was given to Archbishop Di Noia when he received the Dominican habit in 1963 and who, according to legend, recognized the futility of his own endeavor to encompass the infinity of God within the limits of the human mind when he came upon a child trying to scoop the sea into a hole in the sand with a shell. Secondly, the shell reminds us of our baptism in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Finally, recalling the main charge on the coat of arms of His Holiness Benedict XVI, the shell is meant as a devout tribute to Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger who called Father Di Noia to be under-secretary of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith in 2002, and to Pope Benedict XVI who in 2009 named him Titular Archbishop of Oregon City and Secretary of the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments.

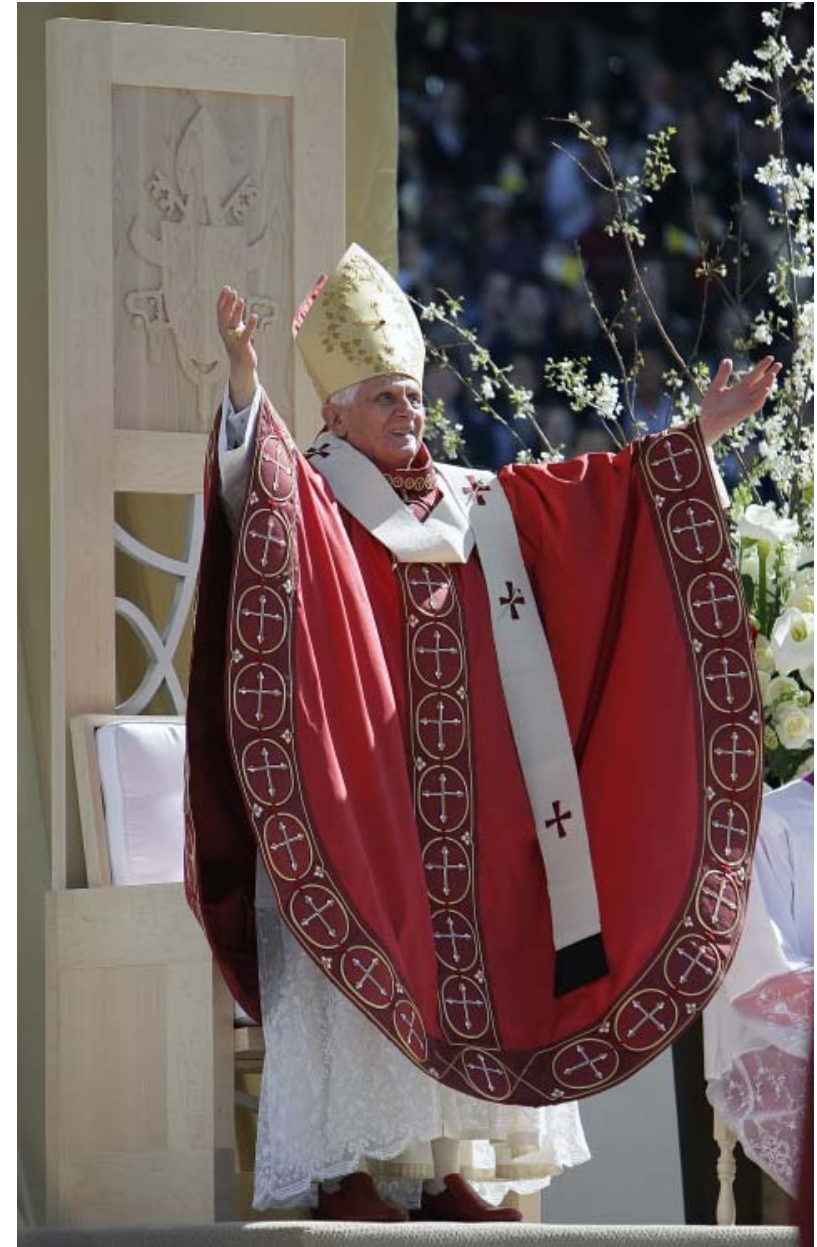

Guidelines for the Reception of Communion

For Catholics

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist when we receive Holy Communion. We are encouraged to receive Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin and normally should have fasted for one hour. A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession. In this case, the person is to be mindful of the obligation to make an act of perfect contrition, including the intention of confessing as soon as possible (canon 916). A frequent reception of the Sacrament of Penance is encouraged for all.

For Our Fellow Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist as our brothers and sisters. We pray that our common baptism and the action of the Holy Spirit in this Eucharist will draw us closer to one another and begin to dispel the sad divisions which separate us. We pray that these will lessen and finally disappear, in keeping with Christ's prayer for us "that they may all be one" (John 17:21).

Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life, and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. Eucharistic sharing in exceptional circumstances by other Christians requires permission according to the directives of the diocesan bishop and the provisions of canon law (canon 844 § 4). Members of the Orthodox Churches, the Assyrian Church of the East, and the Polish National Catholic Church are urged to respect the discipline of their own Churches. According to Roman Catholic discipline, the Code of Canon Law does not object to the reception of communion by Christians of these Churches (canon 844 § 3).

For Non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.

For Those Not Receiving Holy Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

The newly ordained Bishop is commissioned to evangelize with great patience as he is presented with the Book of Gospels.

Handing on of the Insignia

The Ring

The Ring, a sign of fidelity and, according to ancient teaching, spiritual marriage to the Church, is placed on the ring finger of the newly ordained Bishop.

The Miter

The Miter, echoing the miter worn by the High Priest in the Jerusalem Temple and a promise of the “unfading crown of glory,” is placed on the head of the newly ordained Bishop.

The Pastoral Staff

The Pastoral Staff, a sign of the Bishop’s shepherding and governing office to “keep watch over the whole flock in which the Holy Spirit has placed you as Bishop,” is handed to the newly ordained Bishop. The crozier being presented to Archbishop Di Noia today belonged to Fr. Edward Dominic Fenwick, OP (1768-1832), founder of the Dominican Province of St. Joseph and the first bishop of Cincinnati.

Seating of the Bishop and Kiss of Peace

The newly ordained Bishop is seated. He then receives the Kiss of Peace from the Principal Consecrator and from all the other Bishops.

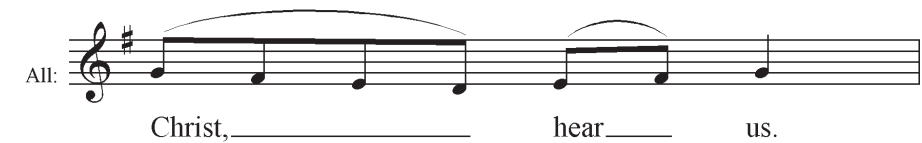

Laying on of Hands

In silence, the Principal Consecrator imposes hands on the head of the Bishop-elect, invoking the power of the Holy Spirit, the same Spirit given by Christ to the Apostles. The Co-Consecrators and all the other Bishops also impose hands, signifying that the Ordination of a Bishop is a collegial act of the Order of Bishops, incorporating a new member into their community, for the service of the Church.

Prayer of Ordination

While the Book of Gospels is held above the head of the Bishop-elect, the Prayer of Ordination is said. This ancient prayer invokes the power of the Holy Spirit upon the Bishop-elect and recalls the importance and role of the Bishop within the Church.

God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ,
Father of mercies and God of all consolation,
who dwell on high and look upon the lowly,
who know all things before they come to be,
and who laid down observances
in your Church through the word of your grace;

who from the beginning,
foreordained a nation of the just,
born of Abraham;

who established rulers and priests
and did not leave your sanctuary without ministers,
and who, from the foundation of the world,
were pleased to be glorified in those you have chosen:

The following part is recited by all the Bishops:

Pour out now upon this chosen one
that power which is from you,
the Spirit of governance
whom you gave to your beloved Son,
Jesus Christ, the Spirit whom he bestowed
upon the holy Apostles, who established the Church
in each place as your sanctuary
for the glory and unceasing praise of your name.

The Principal Consecrator continues alone:

Grant, O Father, knower of all hearts, that this, your servant,
whom you have chosen for the office of Bishop
may shepherd your holy flock.
Serving you night and day, may he fulfill before you
without reproach the ministry of the High Priesthood;
so that, always gaining your favor,
he may offer up the gifts of your holy Church.

Grant that, by the power of the Spirit of the High Priesthood,
he may have the power to forgive sins according to your command,
assign offices according to your decree, and loose every bond
according to the power given by you to the Apostles.

May he please you by his meekness and purity of heart,
presenting a fragrant offering to you through your Son Jesus Christ,
through whom glory and power and honor are yours
with the Holy Spirit in the holy Church,
now and for ever and ever. Amen.

Anointing of the Head
